MARK: FAILURE IS NOT FATAL Rom. 3:10, 23

INTRO:

- Many times we allow a person's failures to define them...Thomas. John 20:24–28; 11:16; 14:5
- 2. There is another New Testament character who refused to allow a failure to define him.

I. MARK'S FAILURES

- A. An alleged failure.
 - 1. Jesus was in the Garden. Mark 14:36
 - 2. Judas arrived, with a crowd. John 18:10, 11
 - 3. Mark 14:51, 52
- B. An actual failure. Acts 13:13; 11:27-30; Col. 4:10; Acts 13:5
- C. We next read of John Mark in Acts 15:37-39.

II. MARK'S FLOURISHING

- A. Mark accompanied Barnabas to Cyprus. Acts 15:39
- B. He is mentioned next in Col. 4:10.
- C. He comes up again in Philemon 23, 24
- D. Paul longs for the company of Timothy as he is near his execution and he knows it. 2 Tim. 4:11
- E. We can draw two conclusions about him.
 - 1. There was a time when Paul wrote him off.
 - 2. Mark redeemed himself.

III. MARK'S FATE.

- A. Tradition tells us he worked with Peter. 1 Pet. 5:13.
- B. Tradition tells us that he died a martyr's death.

CONC:

- 1. We need to know that our failures and the failures of others are not fatal.
- 2. We must forgive ourselves and any who may have failed us and keep on serving the Lord.
